Into the morning

'Because I live, you also will live.' John 14:19b

Getting quickly ready in the morning, coffee, shower and then off to get the kids to school and myself to church — I don't like to rush in the morning. This doesn't sound like a joyful new beginning of a brand-new day. It's more like just a necessary part of everyday routine. On top of that — I'm a morning grouch. Anything before 6:00 am is difficult for me and I need my time to fully wake up, enjoy my morning coffee, read a short devotion, and get myself ready before I must fulfill my 'Mom, Church, and Household Chores'.

But there is another kind of morning — a morning that promises a new beginning and hope. I especially feel this in the hour of dawn, often when I was awake through most of the night. There have been a few nights without sleep in my life, especially when our children were young, and I had to cuddle them through their sleeplessness; when we moved, and we realized that we have more stuff than we thought and there were still tons of boxes to pack; when we travelled and the flights arrived late and we had to drive back from the airport through the night.

At some point the darkness breaks, the sun creeps into the gaps between things, everything gradually takes on shape again. The sounds of the morning are different than those during the day, sharper, clearer – the chirping of the birds, the steam coming from the coffee maker, the first cars on the street. The air is fresh and crisp. It smells like opportunities, adventure, confidence.

Easter morning – when light breaks through the darkness, when the shout of joy 'He is risen. He is risen indeed. Alleluia' sounds into our sadness, when the lonely trumpet plays the first notes of 'Jesus Christ is Risen Today' and then choir and congregation joins – these are precious times when heaven and earth touch each other.

Every morning is a promise. You will live! This promise is renewed every morning. I have seen the dark come and go as the new day began and it seems as if this new day would last forever. All the problems and worries of the previous day are less threatening. In these early hours of the day, somehow there will be a solution. The morning promises that God will not leave us in darkness, that God will let the light shine into our hearts and minds. This is a beautiful feeling to start a new day.

I wish you a blessed Easter, may you feel the new beginning of the Easter morning in your life and remember God's promise: 'Because I live, you also will live.'

Thus, we will change our practice slightly in the future, and will not have a Land Acknowledgement at the beginning of each Sunday Service, but rather on certain occasions, with deeper reflection and meaning.



At the annual meeting this past February, we had a lengthy discussion about the Dream Team's proposal to explore development in our backyard by signing a letter of intent with Kindred Works. In the end, we voted to proceed even though there were many unknowns. If we ultimately proceed with whatever is proposed, there will be a lot of change. Our property will never look the same again. St. Luke's will never be the same again. Sometimes, God leads us into the unknown because it is where we need to go to be a light for others. God is at work

in us. We need to follow His plan for St. Luke's. We have an opportunity to make a positive difference in the lives of many people. To do this, we need to step outside our comfort zone. It's scary. I know this. It will be less scary if we, as the family of St. Luke's, continue to pray for our leadership and one another, and to keep talking about the way forward. God will always walk with us. We walk this path with Him. This is why I firmly believe that St. Luke's will never be completed as long as we, the family of God, dream and put our faith into action.

I realize now that the saying "the more things change, the more they stay the same" is not so odd after all. St. Luke's will continue to change but the more we change the more one thing stays the same. We will always be God's faithful people.

We had a great March 14 meeting, planning for the year, celebrating Fellowship of the Least Coin, and spending some social time together!

Complete reports are not out yet for 2022, but in 2021 fourteen grants were given worldwide – including two in Canada, to support Indigenous women recovering from violence. In 2022, two women received scholarships, and a Special Grant was given to Tonga in the Polynesian Islands focusing on counselling and Christian friendship.

Prayer Shawl Ministry: Elaine Schwartz read a lovely thank you note from a recipient of a prayer shawl which shows us the "power" of this small gesture. Thank you to all who donate yarn and funds to this project and to our knitters!

Our Heating Worries and Solutions

Over the last ten years or so, Church Management has been dealing with our aging heating system. There have been several days when no heat was available, and many band-aid approaches have served us to date. We have replaced fans and motors, cleaned and scrubbed the inner workings, and used anything that would help maintain our heating capacity.

This past summer, during our regular established maintenance, we were advised that the boiler would not last and that we needed a replacement. Repair parts may no longer be available, and we were living on borrowed time for this winter – the boiler is 25 years past its original replacement date being over 60 years old. Thank you to the Property team, who have been closely monitoring the boiler almost every day this winter.

In the fall, two professional management and mechanical volunteers in the congregation set out to determine a replacement. Our members, Roger Wyatt and Carl Hoffman, have been very thorough with their search and work. They presented a proposal to Church Council to search out a replacement for approval in September. Moving forward, they sent out letters to nine companies who deal with heating asking for bids according to established criteria. Four companies submitted bids, with additional questions and criteria being established. Jantzi Plumbing was selected as the best possible match in cost and criteria.

The beginning estimated cost is \$115,000 with 20% contingency costs, amounting to a total of \$138,000. The bidding process and selection was brought back to council for approval in November, and the contract was signed in December with Jantzi Plumbing. The new boiler will be energy efficient and in line with the current building standards. Our heating costs will be significantly reduced.

The timeline for installation begins at the end of March when we take possession of some of the materials, and work will officially begin at the end of the heating season.

Now, for the big question. How will we raise the necessary funds? Heat is a necessity to keep our church building useable for not only ourselves, but our rental groups as well. Finance and Church Council have been consulted with this matter. A fundraising campaign is beginning shortly and will be supplemented by our yearly St. Philips allotment and the Building Fund. Please carefully consider the fundraising request when planning your household budgets.

About the Prayer Box

You have noticed that this box was being brought forward and placed on the altar during the worship service prior to the Prayers of Intercession, every Sunday since we are more normalized after COVID.

The WEPP Team, who had been asked to implement this prayer emphasis, asked Ken Wolfe to build this beautiful box as a continuing focus on prayer in our congregation following the year of prayer in the ELCIC series "Living our Faith" Again, Ken, we say "Thank you" for this fine gift.

The outbreak of the COVID 19 Pandemic caused a two-year delay in the implementation and dedication of the prayer box, and since its introduction it has been brought for prayer more often empty than containing a request. It is hugely underused, and the WEPP team is wondering why?

Reaching out to some of our members asking them specifically about their opinion of the prayer box, we heard these basic points: "We don't need it". "Why do we need it, when we have the prayer list?". "What kind of prayers is it for?" And we thank them for their input.

These questions seem to indicate that, while the WEPP Team issued a short introduction of the prayer box in the Newsletter and in a Temple Talk about it, these efforts were insufficient. They did not hit the mark and left the congregation mostly not well informed. We apologize for such near-sightedness and hope to learn from this mistake.



In answer to these questions, we offer the following explanation:

Yes, we need it. The first two questions are closely related since any request can be placed on the prayer list. However, many of our members are concerned about the length of the prayer list and if all names, some of them having been on the list for years, should they still be on there. Surely this concerns the W&M Committee. We need it to free the Prayer List from one-time or short-term prayer requests.

What kind of prayers? We suggest onetime prayers such as: for a family member, friend, or other acquaintance who is seeking a job; having to decide on which college or university to attend; facing a difficult task; having received a difficult diagnosis; anxiously facing a conversation; any concern that seems to trouble our spirit as we come to worship.

Shortly after the end of worship, after the Postlude, a prayer group of interested people from the congregation gathers in the altar area. The designated prayer box coordinator for that Sunday will introduce the prayer request for prayer by any member of this group and close each request. It is very helpful if the person making a request would attend this session. After the session is ended, the requests for that Sunday will be destroyed. If felt necessary, a specific prayer could be resubmitted for a short time.

In James 5:16, the Scripture calls us to "Confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective."

We hope and pray that the Prayer Box ministry helps to lighten our load of concern for each other.
