The First Sign of Civilization

Welcome one another, therefore, just as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God. Romans 15:7

It was a real sensation 100 years ago: the US-American scholar Margaret Mead travelled to the small island group of Samoa in the southern Pacific at the age of just 23. Unaccompanied. She lived there for several years and talked to adolescent young women about their role in traditional societies. The resulting book, "Coming of Age in Samoa", has greatly influenced our understanding of human behaviour and has become a real bestseller. Margaret Mead discovered how strongly people are influenced by their respective culture and society. This also applies to the fundamental question of what makes us human.

Later, when she was a famous professor, a student pondered about this fundamental question and once asked her what she thought was the first sign of civilization. In other words, where do we draw the line between animal and human behaviour? The student had probably expected Mead to talk about fire or fishhooks, clay pots and whetstones. But no, Mead had a completely different approach. She said: 'The first sign that tells us for sure that we are dealing with civilization is a thigh bone. More precisely: a broken and healed femur. Why is that so? Well, an animal dies when it has a broken leg. When animals break a leg, they can no longer flee from danger. They also can't go to the river to drink or look for food. As an animal with a broken leg, you are just meat for other animals. No animal survives a broken leg long enough for the bone to heal.

A healed broken femur is proof that someone took the time to stay with you. To look after you. They bandaged your wound, brought you to safety and looked after you during your recovery. And that's the beginning of civilization: helping someone else when they're in trouble. From a scientific point of view, this answer is controversial these days. However, I like to take up the impulse that we can find in Margaret Mead's position: All human civilization is based on helping each other. When someone has a broken leg or a broken heart, we become human by supporting each other in situations of need.

In Jesus we see this brought to life: Unconditional love, care and acceptance of our fellow human beings. He practiced it. He lived it. He breathed it. As Christians, we are called to walk in Jesus' footsteps. 'Welcome one another, just as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God' — words from the apostle Paul, written to the congregation in Rome. This verse makes the reader understand that mutual respect is a highly Christian matter despite differences we might have. We are called to overcome any caveats and prejudices and to not look at the things which separate us, but rather at the things which unite us, because God himself has acted in this way towards people in Jesus Christ. In Christ we are united.

In a world in which individualism rules, the idea of a healed femur as the first sign of civilization speaks to me. This is what makes us human. And, in helping and welcoming our neighbours, we glorify God.

May the rest of our 'after Pentecost' and autumn season, be a time fulfilled with joy, love and mutual care for one other.

The Season of Creation begins on September 1, the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation, and ends on October 4, the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of ecology beloved by many Christian denominations.

Congregational Report from Eastern Synod ELCIC Assembly

Just over 200 people including Rostered Pastors and Congregational Delegates gathered in Toronto for our Eastern Synod ELCIC Assembly.

After an inspiring opening worship service at 1:00 pm on Thursday, we began working through a full agenda. We did break for dinner, but then worked straight through until 9:00 pm.

Our second day was equally full, beginning with an opening worship service at 8:30 am and concluding at 5:00 pm.

A lot of the necessary work of any assembly includes reviewing the many reports of the various committees throughout the synod. There is a lot of material to cover since these assemblies only occur every three years.

Included among these reports, we approved the proposed synodical operating budget for the next three years.

One of the biggest tasks that we had at this Assembly was to elect our new Bishop. In addition, we needed to elect a new Vice Chair of Synod Council, a new Secretary, and a new Treasurer.

It took 5 ballots to finally elect our new Bishop. I am very happy to report that we have chosen an excellent candidate from Saskatchewan, Rev. Carla Blakley.

Pastor Heike is already acquainted with Rev. Carla, and we had the pleasure of her company at our table at the banquet on Friday evening and again at the closing worship service on Saturday.

During scheduled breaks, and while gathering before sessions, there was time to visit with other delegates from across our Synod. It is reassuring to know that we are not alone in our struggles and that many congregations share the same issues that we have.

One of the highlights of any assembly is our opportunity to recognize the achievements of both our rostered clergy and Lay Leaders. Pastor Jim Bindernagel was recognized for his 60 years of ordained service in our synod.

Of course, another highlight was to be able to recognize Bishop Michael Pryse for his many years of dedicated service to our synod.

I can report that while some congregations within our synod will face some challenges in the near future, and that some congregations will struggle, that there is still much optimism about the future of our Church.

One hopeful sign for me was the attendance and active participation of youth delegates. One of these delegates has been elected to our Synod Council.

We should be very grateful for the excellent leadership that our synod has enjoyed over the past many years, and will continue to have with our newly elected officers.

We can look forward to the future with confidence with our newly elected Bishop and the officers who were chosen at this assembly.

We also were able to hear and see video greetings from our sister synods in Guyana, Jordan, and the Holy Land. It was very impactful and moving to hear from them as they expressed their gratitude to our retiring Bishop and to the ELCIC for our ongoing support. The Bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land also described

the terrible situation and daily horror taking place in Jerusalem and the West Bank.

It is one thing to read accounts of this war in the news and see this on TV. This firsthand account certainly brings the situation into clear focus and clarity when you hear from someone who is living through these horrors every day.

I believe that this was the third time that I have had the privilege to attend a synodical assembly. As I reflected on my experience this time, I am reminded of just how important our synod is in representing our church both nationally and globally.

I would like to thank St. Luke's congregation for allowing me to attend this historic assembly. I would be happy to discuss my experience with you during our Coffee Fellowship.
