# \*Children's Message

Mark 4:26-29

Then Jesus said, "God's kingdom is like seed thrown on a field by a man who then goes to bed and forgets about it. The seed sprouts and grows—he has no idea how it happens. The earth does it all without his help: first a green stem of grass, then a bud, then the ripened grain. When the grain is fully formed, he reaps—harvest time!

With this story Jesus wants to encourage us to be patient and trust in God. Just as in the growth and development of nature many things happen without our intervention, God is also at work in our lives. It is important to have open eyes and ears for this. Then we will not simply take everything for granted, but learn to marvel and thus discover the small and large 'miracles' of everyday life. One such miracle is the growth of a tree, which we I would like to act out together with you.

Material: Apple Seeds, brown, yellow, blue, green fabric, rose petals and security needles, apples, basket

Have 2 children sit down on the steps, cover them with brown fabric.

It all starts with these little apple seeds, which you can barely see. They probably fell to the ground, in an apple - and as the apple slowly rots and decays, the seeds go into the earth. They rest there for a while. Then the sun comes and warms the ground.

A child places yellow fabric (= sun) on the brown fabric.

And the rain falls, so that the earth becomes moist.

A child comes with a blue fabric (= water) and also places it on the brown fabric.

The seed stirs. A small shoot grows upwards and roots grow downwards to nourish and support this shoot.

Children straighten up and slowly raise their hands upwards. Unfolding the green fabric with petals inward.

The shoot becomes a tree. A lot of time passes. Every year the trunk grows bigger and stronger. Branches and twigs grow at the top. In the meantime, the leaves have also unfolded. The tree has turned green right down to the finest tips.

One day the time has come: buds have grown on the branches and now they are opening, the flowers are unfolding.

Flip green fabric over. Show petals.

The tree is covered all over with white and pink blossoms, the colours glow freshly in the sun and they smell so good. This scent attracts the bees.

Children come as bees and run around buzzing. Have them swirl around coloured scarves.

They visit the tree and land on the flowers to collect the sweet nectar. In doing so, they pollinate the flowers so that fruit can form. Time passes again. The blossoms have disappeared again and small apples grow in their place.

Turn over the green fabric again. Have children hold up apples.

So autumn comes and slowly the apples ripen. They glow yellow and red and seem to laugh at us and call out: 'Pick me, take me down, I'm ripe!' Harvest time is here.

A child comes with a basket and picks the apples.

We are happy about the ripe apples, we want to bite into them and eat some. They taste good and we are grateful for the apples, for everything that goes into making them ripe, and we feel that there is someone who makes everything grow. We celebrate Thanksgiving!

Thank you God for all that grows,

## \* Message

Open our ears, O Lord, to hear your word and know your voice. Speak to our hearts and strengthen us, that we may serve you now and always. Amen.

I love today's gospel lesson from Jesus' sermon on the mount. The picture it paints with the birds in the air and the lilies in the field always gets me. It's a beautiful thought – don't worry, God provides. And yet it's a text that challenges me to the core. Because I worry. I actually worry a lot. I'm worried about the condition of our world, the wars in the Near East, Ukraine, I'm worried about the future of our Evangelical Lutheran Church and of our future here at St. Luke's, I'm worried for the future of my children – will they be able to find their calling and live a life in peace and freedom? But most of all I'm very worried about God's beautiful creation. We already experience more severe or unusual weather conditions. The pictures of burned down parts of Jasper in summer were shocking, we feel with the people in Florida especially as some of you have friends and family there and who doesn't like to spend happy times on the shores of the Gulf of Mexico or the Atlantic? We saw floods in Europe and droughts in Africa.

We kind of know that our lifestyle has something to do with climate change, but we are far away from any lifestyle changes. God entrusted his creation to us and what are we doing with it? Exploiting our planet. I know, that changes are hard and I for myself I know exactly how often I fail. When convenience wins over eco-friendliness. When I take the car although I could use my bike, or when I get Take out with lot's of packaging instead of cooking myself. But yes, I'm very worried about the condition of our world, about the future of this world for our children.

And I think, it's okay when my face will frown in moments like this, when I think about the condition of this world. When Jesus tells us in the gospel that we should not worry then he doesn't mean that we shouldn't worry at all. What he is saying here is that we should

worry about the important things, which is everything that has to do with our way of living. We need to ask ourselves: Does our lifestyle contributes to the building of God's kingdom or is it counterproductive? Destroying of our environment is for sure not a building block in God's kingdom.

The gospel tells us: We don't need to worry, because God provides for us. There is food for all of us. There is enough. And now we are coming to the point – it's that little word enough. We have enough, why do we always want more?

A good question to ponder at Thanksgiving. As far as we know, human beings have always given thanks for the fruit of the field and the yield of nature, since times immemorial. Many of our ancient ancestors knew times of scarcity; they knew hunger and want; they knew illness and death because of a lack of food. They knew that enough food for survival was not a given. And so they celebrated with abundance and thankfulness after a good hunting and gathering season, or, later in history, after a good harvest. And because people knew enough food could not be taken for granted, and that the seed would sprout and grow, and they would not know how – they gave thanks for this miraculous provision to their respective gods and goddesses.

We celebrate this Thanksgiving for the harvest here in our church, as many church communities still do today in many places in Europe and North America. But the enthusiasm for this festival has decreased quite a bit. Maybe it has something to do with the fact that, in this day and age, we don't lack anything. We have more than enough of everything. Food is overabundant to the point that we can afford to waste it and throw it away. If there's so much of everything, why be thankful? Do we still understand growth and harvest as a mystical cycle, something we, if we are honest with ourselves, still can't quite explain? That a tiny seed yields a tomato plant, an ear of corn, a big lemon tree? Have we lost the awe of the mysterious provision of all the things we need in life?

But I dare say that, overall, we may have to yet learn again what it means to lead lives full of thanks. In my former congregation in Germany, I once created a Worship Service with confirmation students around the topic 'Thankfulness'. Easy enough I thought, but it wasn't. The young people were especially struggling with the message of the day. What could they say about thankfulness? And the first (and almost only) answer they themselves came up with: It makes people want to do nice things for you if you show your appreciation.

I was just blown away that apparently the next generation sees thankfulness as something that serves them, you know, you better thank grandma for her gift, so that she continues to send more in the future. But then I realized: It's not just that the next generation is a bunch of ungrateful twits. After all, we raised them. *We* are the ones who are their examples, their role models, their teachers. Is it something that we will show those children, that we only give thanks if it serves our needs? Or will we model lives lived in

gratefulness to them? Unfortunately, we tend to focus often on what we don't have instead of taking an honest stock of what we do have, and give thanks for the abundance. Food, shelter, clothing, entertainment options, family, friends. Isn't that something to be deeply thankful for? Shouldn't we say thank you to God, and at the same time wonder why *we* have been showered with so many good gifts? What we have done to deserve such abundance?

Where comes the worry in then? Well gratitude is the antidote to worry, I quote from an unknown source, because anxiety/worry is grasping for a hold of what we do not have in the future. And gratitude is being thankful for what we do have in the present. For if we chase only after the things we don't have but think we ought to have, and forget to enjoy what's been given to us, we chase the dream of a supposedly better life without truly living in the moment. And we lose the chance to live life to the fullest.

So it is only right and salutary that we should give thanks at all times and in all places. It is only right and appropriate that we should give thanks on this day, as we enjoy the bounty of God's miraculous provisions – and on every day that we experience God's goodness and mercy and blessing – which is, every day.

This would be a good time to say 'amen'. But just one more thought. It is one thing to say thank you to God. But there is more to thanksgiving. Listen to the word: thanks – *giving*. As people of God, we are people called into community. We don't exist by and for ourselves. With every gift comes a responsibility. What we have received we are called to share. That's why, today, not only our sanctuary is decorated with the fruit of the field, but the people of God also give thanks by bringing gifts for the less fortunate ones in society. In September we collected food items and more for Canadian Food for Children and all year round we support Stanley Park Eats with. Thanks so much for everyone who contributed and for your generosity.

We *give* thanks by giving back to God, whom we encounter in our neighbour in need. Let me close with another quote by a great man, John F. Kennedy. He said, 'As we express our gratitude, we must never forget that the highest appreciation is not to utter words, but to live by them.' To which I say now. Amen.

And the peace of God which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Amen.
